5.4 Delegation from Manohar Singh Bal, Secretary and Director of Religious Affairs, Gurdwara Guru Nanak Mission Centre, re: Community Safety and Well-being

Manohar Singh Bal, Secretary and Director of Religious Affairs, Gurdwara Guru Nanak Mission Centre expressed concerns surrounding the lack of police and community working relationship and suggested the establishment of a working model to address safety concerns in the community that would bring the Brampton Community safety Advisory Committee, City of Brampton Staff and Peel Regional Police together. Mr. Singh Bal expressed the view that stronger relationships are needed within the community to develop trust and open conversations.

Ivan Marco Macri, encouraged Mr. Singh Bal to reach out to the community liaison officers to organize a townhall meeting to build bridges with the new police officers.

Supt. Navdeep Chhinzer, Peel Regional Police, advised they are committed to building bridges with the communities. Peel Regional Police have established a number of working groups that are directly and strategically put together to engage with the community. The Chief's resource council is something the Chief of Police wants to get in contact with 'Boots on the Ground' for sharing and receiving information. It is a group of individuals from all faith groups and all communities that have the opportunity to connect with the Chief and senior leaders and officers to engage in an open dialogue.

5.5 Delegation from Dan Clark, Chair of Board, Grace Retirement and Community Enterprises Inc. (Grace Court), re: Senior Safety - To Restrict Public Access and Install Resident-Only Gated Access on Private Property Pedestrian Walkway at Grace Court

Dan Clark, Chair of Board, Grace Retirement and Community Enterprises Inc. (Grace Court) expressed safety concerns regarding 17 Scott Street, Ward 1 walkway. The City of Brampton built a modern paved fully lite pathway to Rosealea Park, making the seniors residence walkway no longer needed by the public. Strangers are continuously cutting through the seniors property 24 hours a day and over the last 6 months there have been numerous break-in's, drug use, sex traffic worker activity in the washrooms and loitering. Many residence are afraid to sit in the building common room. Peel Regional Police have completed a full CPTED property audit and an independent consultant was hired to complete a more comprehensive security audit. Mr. Clark advised that both audits identified the walkway as a vulnerability with a comprehensive audit recommending anti-climb gates and restricted access to the walk way. The non-profit board has voted unanimously to install anti-climb pedestrian gates with resident fob access and emergency services would receive override codes. The building is an affordable housing provider, rent is capped at less than 80 percent of the average market rate in Brampton and revenue is limited. Residents are paying for the gate themselves and are looking for the City of Brampton's support and agreement to have the gates installed. Residents are not looking for monetary assistance, simply an agreement for residents to secure the private property for the safety of the seniors. Mr. Clark requested the Committee support the request and direct staff to provide a letter confirming the City of Brampton has no objections to the installation of a resident only gate on the walkway.

Councillor Santos, suggested the matter be referred to staff for consideration and a report back to the Committee of Council meeting on January 14, 2026.

Brampton residents asked questions and provided remarks with respect to Peel Regional Police communication with communities when tragic events unfold and expressed concerns regarding extortion, gun violence, stronger policing and suggested easement with respect to gun laws and increase in surveillance camera's at intersections.

Supt. Navdeep Chhinzer, Peel Regional Police, advised that information goes through a Media Liaison Officer and the Community Afforments and Response Unit, within 48-72 hours we have officers that attend specific targeted communities to get the information out.

Councillor Santos responded to questions and provided clarification regarding the concerns expressed by Brampton residents.

FAITH LEADERS DISCUSS COMPLEX ISSUES AT ANNUAL MEETING

On February 10, 2026, CSWO hosted the Annual Faith Leaders' Meeting at Brampton City Hall, bringing together 114 faith leaders and community partners. This year's meeting included a multi-faith panel that explored how global issues affect residents locally, with a focus on building community bridges and highlighting the role faith leaders play in addressing issues like poverty, homelessness, and domestic violence. CSWO and partners also presented on topics such as hate crime prevention, encampments and extortion and shared key resources including the Lighthouse Program, food security supports, and housing help.

Mayor Patrick Brown and Members of Council attended the meeting, which helped the City better understand the changing needs, challenges and important roles faith communities play in fostering connections and resilience among residents. The presentations and discussions helped faith leaders gain insight into City and community resources, as well as connect with each other to navigate shared concerns and best practices.

Since 2019, this meeting has celebrated Brampton's diversity and play through inter-faith dialogue, and has helped to build a more connected, resilient and safer Brampton.

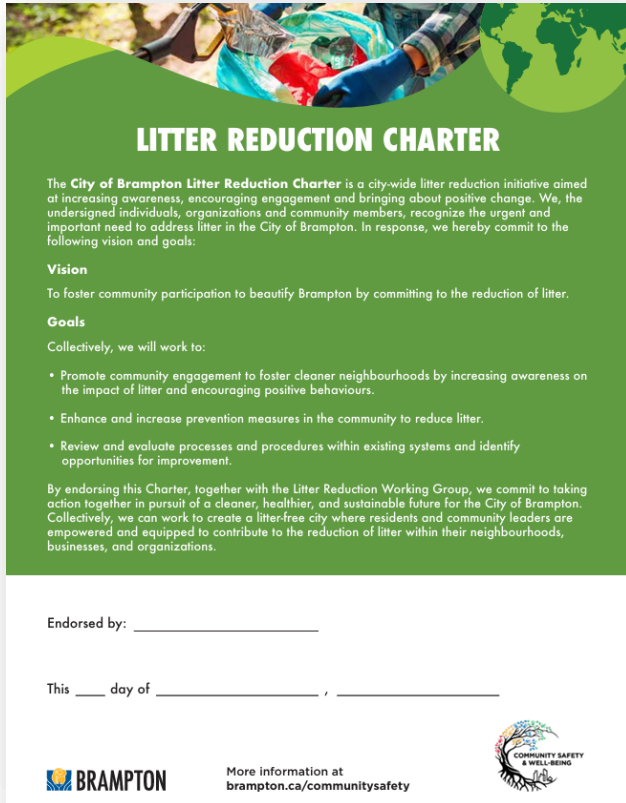

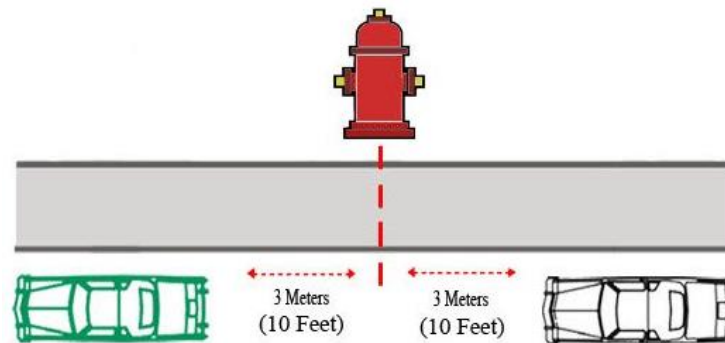

The Basics



Parking is not permitted:

- Within 3 metres of a Fire Hydrant
- Within 9 metres of an intersection
- Within a Bike Lane
- During a winter event

School Crossing

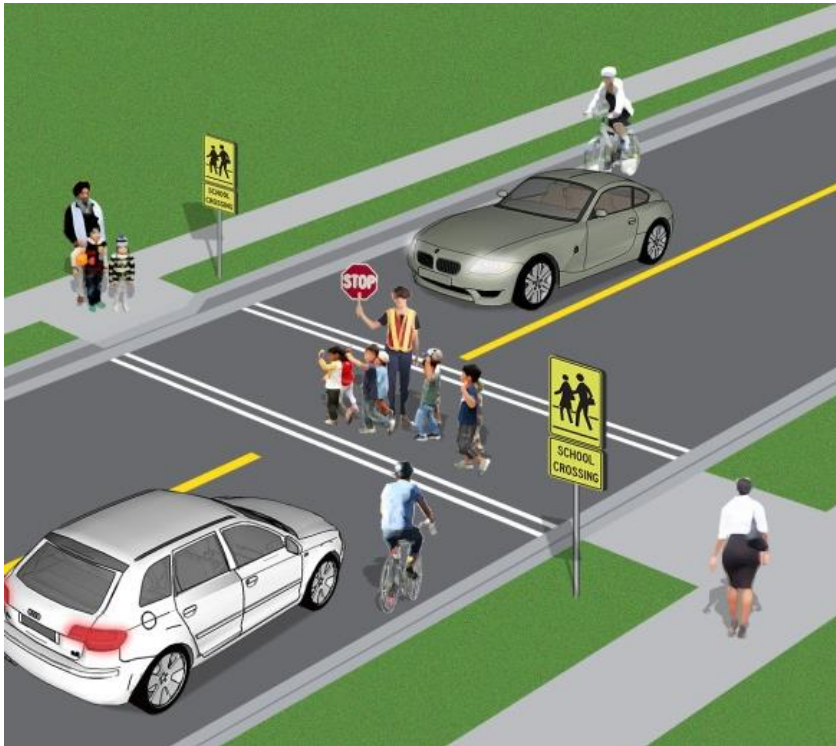


Pedestrian Crossover



Pedestrian Crosswalk at Traffic Light

School Crossing



A school crossing is any pedestrian crossing where a:

- school crossing guard is present
- school crossing stop sign is displayed

Crossings are easily identified by the yellow-green fluorescent “school crossing” signs.

At school crossings, drivers are only required to stop and yield the entire roadway when a school crossing guard is present.



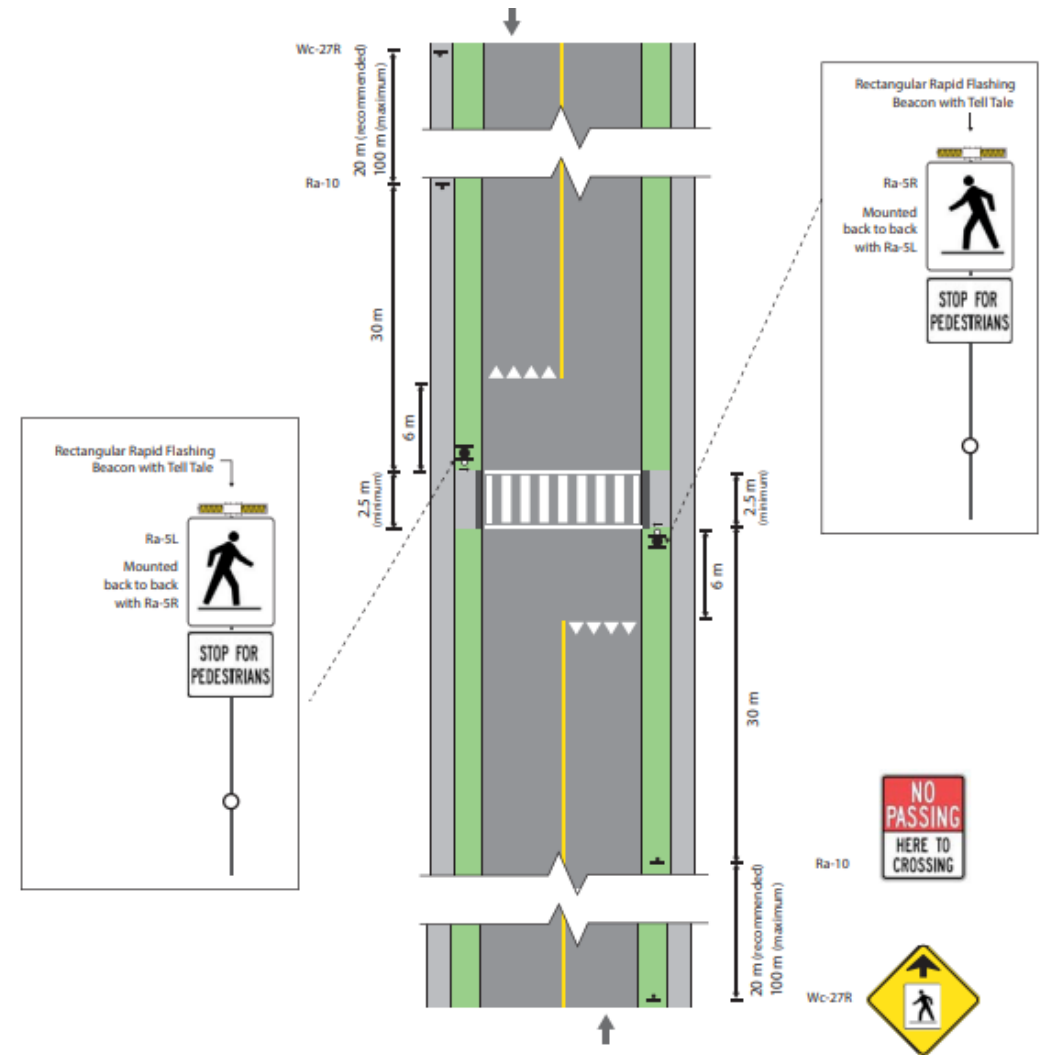
Pedestrian Crossovers



Types:

- **Type B:** Overhead and side-mounted signs + flashing beacons.
 - **Type C:** Side-mounted signs + flashing beacons.
 - **Type D:** Side-mounted signs only (no flashing beacons).
- Motorists must stop for pedestrians at all times of the day and yield the entire roadway.
 - Features enhanced pavement markings, signage and lighting.
 - Pedestrians using a Pedestrian Crossover should point across the road in the direction they are walking to clearly indicate their intention to motorists.
 - School Crossing Guards may also be present at these locations.

Pedestrian Crossovers



Pedestrian Crosswalks at Traffic Lights



Pedestrian signals help pedestrians cross at intersections with traffic lights.

A pedestrian facing a walk signal may cross the road in the direction of the signal.

A pedestrian facing a flashing or steady hand symbol should not begin to cross the road.

Pedestrians who have already begun to cross when the hand signal appears can finish crossing.

Safety in School Zones

School Bus Safety



- Drivers in both directions must stop.
- If you are behind the bus, stop at least 20 metres back.
- If the bus is coming toward you, stop far enough away to let children get on or off safely and cross the road.
- Use the bus to cross the road during pick-up and drop-off.

School Zone Signs



Cannot park but can stop briefly to load/unload

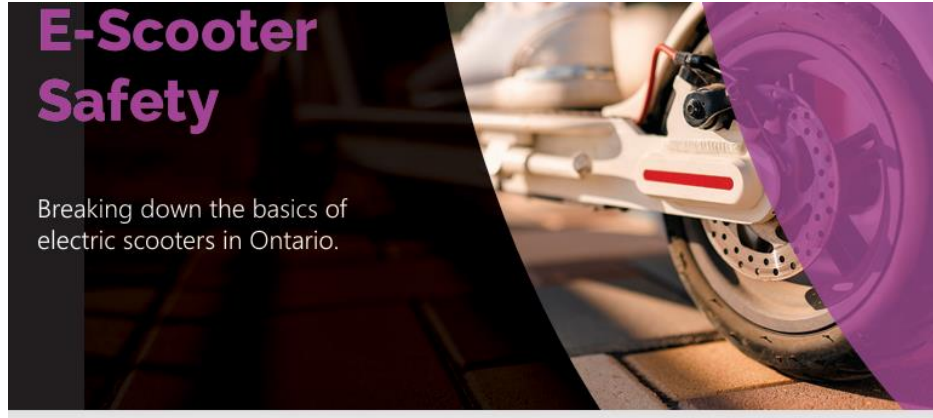


Cannot stop, even momentarily to load/unload

Provincial E-Scooter Pilot



E-Scooter Requirements

E-scooters must have:

- two wheels (one on the front, one on the back)
- brakes
- a platform for standing
- a handlebar for steering
- a horn or bell
- at least one white light on front, one red light on rear and reflective material on sides
- maximum 500W electric motor and maximum speed of 24 km/h

E-scooters must not have:

- pedals
- a seat
- a basket
- any motor modifications

Consequences

- Similar to bicycles, all *Highway Traffic Act* rules of the road apply when riding e-scooters.
- Violations can result in fines and penalties.
- Impaired operation is illegal.

Rider Requirements

You must:

- be at least 16 years old
- always stand while riding
- wear a bicycle helmet if under 18 years old

You are not permitted to:

- carry passengers
- carry cargo
- park in areas designated for vehicles or pedestrians
- operate an e-scooter on controlled access highways

Reminders

- E-scooters cannot be used on municipal roads without a bylaw. Check your local municipality to see if and where you can ride.
- Use bicycle lanes (where available).
- Yield to cyclists and pedestrians.

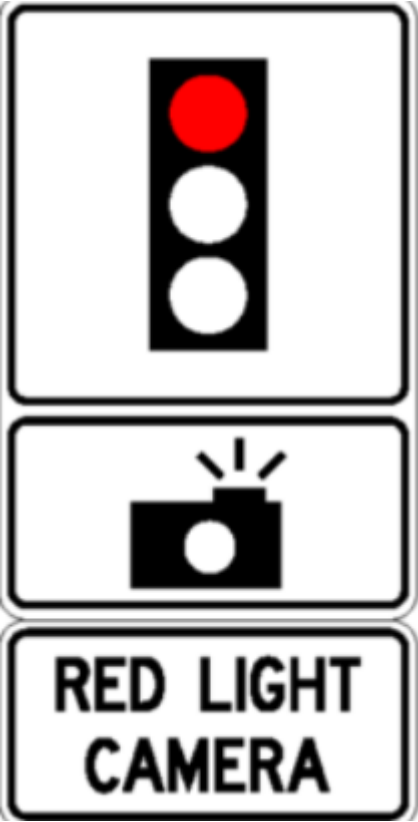

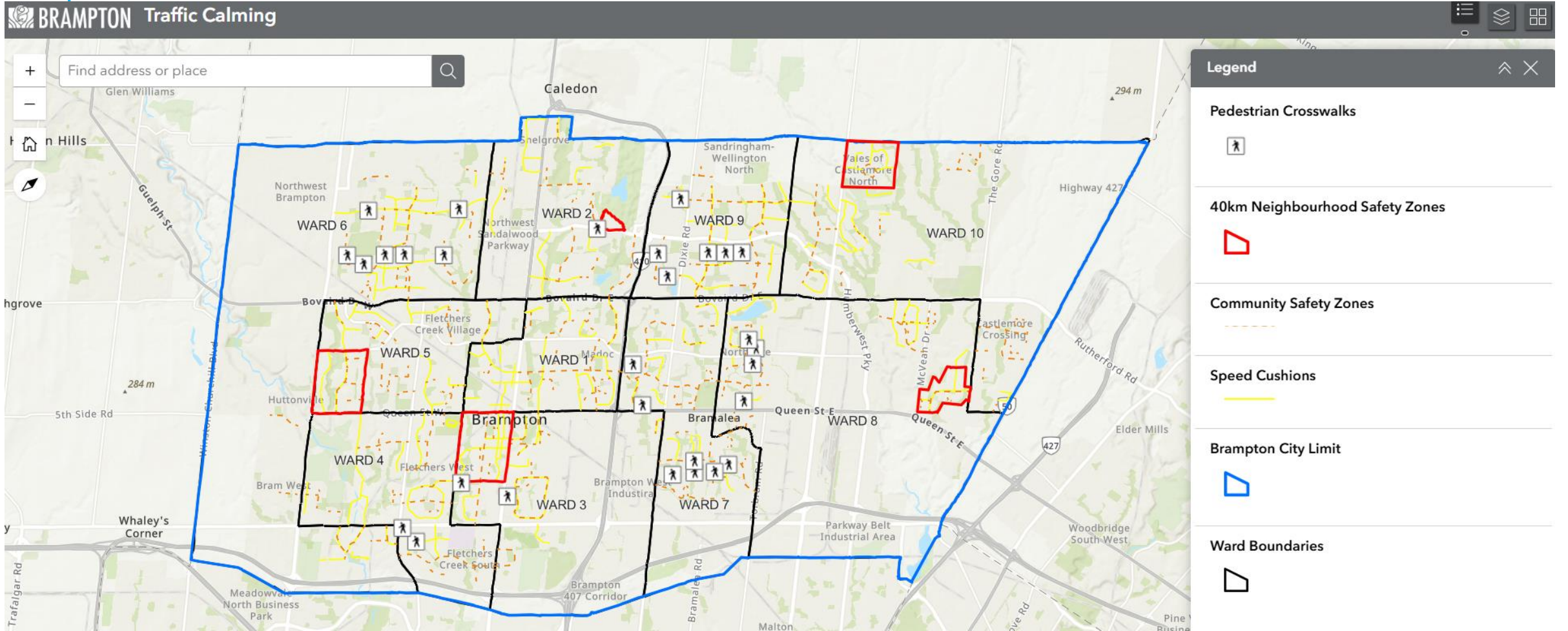

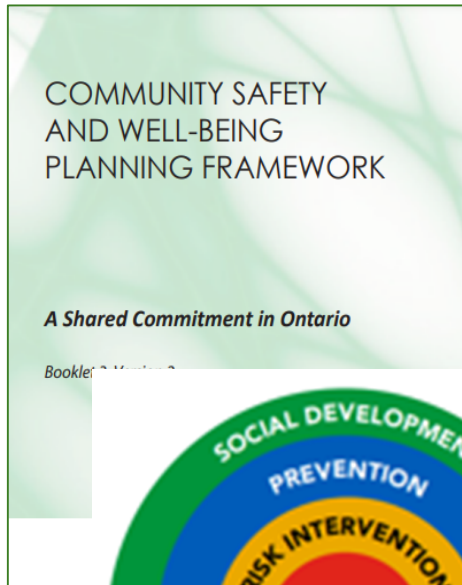

- In 2023 police responded to just over 16,000 incidents of family and intimate partner violence –an average of 44 disputes per day, or nearly two every hour.
- In 2024, emergency food providers reported increased service demand of 40-60% compared to the previous year.
- Since 2023, an estimated 91,000 households across Peel were lacking adequate affordable and suitable housing.
- Peel unemployment rate has consistently been higher than Ontario's rate.
- Emergency departments are seeing a surge in mental health related visits, with over 19,000 case in 2023 alone, a 5% increase from the previous year.
