Official Plan: What is it?

- Clarifies and provides city building objectives
- Guides the realization of a vision for the future of the city
- Identifies and defines the components of the city – not as they are today, but as they are envisioned
- Provides a policy framework to make the vision real



A New Brampton Official Plan = Brampton Plan

Brampton is preparing to develop a new Official Plan (OP)

- To be adopted by Brampton Council and Peel Regional Council
- A key focus for implementing the Brampton 2040 Vision, and master plans

Why is Brampton Plan Necessary?

Brampton Plan will replace Brampton's 2006 Official Plan, which:

- Was approved and published in 2008
- No longer fully reflects City priorities, or embodies best practices in municipal land use planning

Why is Brampton Plan Necessary?

The **Provincial legislation** governing municipal planning has also been updated recently

To conform with the initiatives of **Brampton's 2040 Vision** and the **Regional Official Plan**

"The purpose of the OP is to set out the municipality's general planning goals and policies that will guide future land use in relationship to provincial initiatives, the Regional Official Plan and City initiatives."



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



What is a City Structure?




A City Structure schedule is intended to identify key structural elements and relationships that will guide future growth in Brampton. It identifies where:

- Growth should be directed, and conversely where it should not;
- Key intensification nodes and corridors are located;
- Higher order transit corridors are located;
- Residents and business owners live and work in Brampton; and
- Significant green networks are located (natural and man-made).




2040 VISION STRUCTURE – CONCEPTUAL (2018)




















Brampton Plan City Structure (DRAFT)

Population & Employment Projections to 2051





----Preferred Scenario ----Current Trends Scenario ----Historical




Employment Projections to 2051


City of Brampton Employment Forecast City of Brampton Employment Forecast, 2016 to 2051



COVID-19 Update

Ridership

2021 to 2020 for the period of Jan 1 to Mar 31

- Jan 1 to Mar 31, 48% of 2020 ridership
- Note: Ceased Fare collection on March 21, 2020

Safe Restart Agreement


- Brampton's allocation of funding under phase 3 of the Safe Restart Agreement is approx. \$23.5M.
- The funding was received on March 24, 2021 and placed in an interest bearing City reserve account.

Electric Bus Pilot Project

Brampton's milestone electric buses are launching in service this Spring.

- Electric buses will be launched on route 26 Mount Pleasant first followed by route 23 Sandalwood.
- In total, Brampton Transit has eight battery electric buses to the fleet, two from Nova Bus and six from New Flyer.
- Four high-powered (450 kWh) overhead pantograph onroute charging stations have been installed to support this launch:
 - Mount Pleasant Village terminal (2 ABB on-route)
 - Queen Street/Highway 50 Züm station (1 ABB onroute)
 - Sandalwood Transit Facility (1 Siemens at facility)





Third Transit Facility

Brampton Transit's Third Transit Maintenance and Storage Facility receives funding through Investing in Canada Infrastructure Plan (ICIP).

- The funding is through the Public Transit Infrastructure Stream (PTIS) for phase 1 construction of Transit's Third Maintenance and Storage Facility.
 - Federal Government contribution: Over \$69.9 M
 - Provincial Government contribution: Over \$58.2 M
 - City of Brampton contribution: Over \$46.6 M
- The project includes the construction of a nearly 400,000 square foot transit maintenance and storage facility with up to 36 maintenance bays and approximately 40 overhead garage doors to accommodate 250 buses, in addition to administrative and maintenance support space.

- Final Environmental Assessment Approval
- Execute Transfer payment Agreements
- Issue RFP for the design/build of Phase 1 to the pre-qualified proponents.


Hurontario-Main LRT Extension Study

Study Process

- The evaluation of options is a multi-level process that has occurred over the course of the study.
- Through the three-level process, the long list of LRT options was evaluated and narrowed down to a short list. The short list was evaluated and is being presented at Virtual Open House 2.

The Transit Project Assessment Process (TPAP) is a provincial environmental assessment process developed specifically for the approval of public transit projects.

Proponents must complete the prescribed steps of the process within specified time frames.



Hurontario-Main LRT Extension Study

Preliminary Design Business Case

- The City of Brampton evaluated the short list options using the Metrolinx Business Case framework. A preliminary design business case (PDBC) was used to assess the short-listed options.
- The analysis included four (4) business cases: Strategic, Economic, Financial, and Deliverability and Operations.



Hurontario-Main LRT Extension Study

Short List of Options

Since the last virtual open house in Summer 2020, we've evaluated the short list options (four surface and two underground).

Note: The loop options presented in the previous open house were not advanced to the short list for further assessment due to physical constraints (i.e. issues accommodating longer LRVs / impacts to property).
