- Public feedback was received in the development phase and Final phase























# GUIDING PRINCIPLES

#### I. ALIGNMENT WITH CITY-BUILDING:

Brampton Library's facility planning and library provision model will align with the City of Brampton's vision for its future urban structure and placemaking objectives.

#### 2. KEEPING PACE:

Brampton Library will provide facility space in a manner that keeps pace with the City of Brampton's future population growth.

#### 3. SUPPORTING NEIGHBOURHOODS:


Brampton Library branches will reflect and respond to the needs of the neighbourhoods and communities in which they are located.

#### 4. A PLACE FOR EVERYBODY:

Brampton Library branches will welcome all people with an aim of inspiring personal growth and building community capacity.

#### 5. INCUBATION, INNOVATION & CREATIVITY:

Brampton Library branches will be a place where the ideas are nurtured and cultivated into actions for the benefit of Brampton residents and businesses.







### EMBEDDING LIBRARIES IN THE NEW URBAN STRUCTURE

- The Brampton 2040 Vision identifies a new 'Uptown', a revitalized Downtown, and five 'Town Centres' where Brampton Library can play a pivotal role in supporting residential and employment uses
- An estimated 698,000 people presently live in Brampton, representing growth of 156,000 persons when the previous Facilities Master Plan was approved in 2011
- Another 156,000 persons are forecasted to be added over the Facilities Master Plan's 10-year planning period to reach a population of 854,000 by 203 l
- Libraries will play a critical role in defining the intended quality of life through arts, education, business development, and civic engagement they will also be core services in existing Built-Up Areas where up to 50,000 new residents are projected to arrive by 2040.

## LIBRARY SPACE PER CAPITA

- Brampton <u>ranks last</u> among Canada's largest cities in terms of library space per capita at 0.29 ft<sup>2</sup>/capita (average is 0.46 ft<sup>2</sup>/capita)
- In Ontario, many library systems target a service level in the range of 0.6 square feet per capita, a level that Brampton Library has historically strived towards
- Despite recent investment in new libraries (e.g. Springdale), Brampton's strong population growth has made it difficult to improve per capita service levels

## **FUTURE SPACE NEEDS**


- Brampton Library should continue to plan its space needs based on its previously endorsed target of 0.6 ft<sup>2</sup> per capita,
- Brampton Library will need to continue being pragmatic in more than doubling of its library space
- Previous Library Facilities Master Plans have impressed upon the urgency of building up the per capita space provision but library space funding has been unable to keep pace with population growth
- It is imperative that Brampton Library increase its service level so that growth-related funding through Development Charges does not fall behind further


# LIBRARY SPACE DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY: EXISTING DISTRIBUTION







## PROPOSED DISTRIBUTION



### Growth Opportunities include:

- East Brampton where there is a sizeable geographic gap
- Queen/Rutherford Hub
- Uptown Hub
- Heritage Heights (location 1 and 2)
- CAA Lands
- Also includes a permanent location at Embleton and a Central Library





## SUMMARY OF NEW SPACE DEVELOPMENTS

- Attaining 0.6 square feet per capita would require 307,300 square feet of net new library space to be added by 2031
- The proposed strategy could address up to 88% of this requirement by adding up to 280,500 square feet.
- It would bring Brampton Library in line with its peers while strongly complementing the innovative city-building activities that are being advanced by the City of Brampton

## POTENTIAL EXISTING BRANCH IMPROVEMENTS

- Full interior renovation of South Fletcher's Branch
- Expand the **Makerspace** at Chinguacousy Branch and add new Makerspaces at the Cyril Clark and Mount Pleasant Village Branches
- Carry out Accessibility Audits or similar assessment to identify upgrades for persons with disabilities
- **Update furniture and equipment** at selected branches to refresh space, increase accessibility and enable greater access to power outlets
