BASKETBALL IS CANADA'S SPORT

- 50% YoY growth in participation in minor basketball programs across the country.
- #1 most played sport for children in Canada (33% basketball vs. 27% soccer).
- #2 favorite sport among millennials.
- Canada is the #1 provider (non-American) of players in the NBA.
- #1 coolest sport amongst 18-24-year-olds and for newcomers and immigrants to Canada.
- Youth basketball participation in Canada grew by 230,000 new participants in 2019-2020.
- 56% increase in viewership ratings for basketball content across Canada.
- A record 6.9 million broadcast impressions were gained in 2021 by the CEBL.

NEW TEAMS, NEW CONFERENCES AND FUTURE EXPANSION PLANS

Three new teams join the CEBL in 2023 – the Calgary Surge, Winnipeg Sea Bears and Brampton Honey Badgers - as the league shifts to a Western and Eastern Conference model, creating stronger rivalries across Canada.

The CEBL plans to expand to a 14-16 team league that spreads from coast-to-coast over the next four years.

Some of the preferred expansion markets include BC,

Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes.



LEAGUE ATTENDANCE

- Six sellouts in 2023 home openers.
- A league-record single-game attendance of 7,303 in Winnipeg Sea Bears' inaugural game and home opener.
- Honey Badgers franchise record 3,435 in the inaugural School Day game on June 7. However, due to timing of the recent move to Brampton, additional marketing is required to bring Honey Badgers attendance on par with the rest of the CEBL.
- League-wide average 2,739 attendance through first 28 games of the season (as of June 12).

HONEY BADGERS HISTORY

- 55 wins in 85 games all time (as of June 12).
- Four playoff appearances:
 - o 2019 Finalist
 - o 2020 Semifinalist
 - o 2021 Quarter-Finalist
 - o **2022 Champions**
- 79% (50 of 63) of players have played professionally in the fall following their CEBL season with the Honey Badgers.
- Three former Honey Badgers have signed with NBA clubs:
 - Nino Johnson (2021) Utah Jazz
 - Lindell Wigginton (2022) Milwaukee Bucks
 - Christian Vital (2022 Present)- Toronto Raptors
- 10 players have represented three different countries (Nigeria, Great Britain, and Canada) at the international level in various FIBA events.
- Former Assistant Coach Brittni Donaldson is now an Assistant Coach with the Atlanta Hawks, the first female coach in franchise history, and is one of seven active in the NBA.

- The new "We Are Brampton" jerseys will be worn during the nationally televised game July 26 at CAA Centre.





- A similar Council was created in Ottawa, forging new partnerships, while aligning municipal priorities including economic development and tourism.


