Response to Gender-Based Violence: Highlighted Actions (2019-present)

- Since 2019, the City of Brampton has taken over 65
 individual actions to combat violence against women
 through awareness, empowerment, and advocacy.
 Highlights are captured below.
- 2019 City Council motion to continue to support and work with existing programs at the Region of Peel who are providing services to those affected by domestic violence, and to support public awareness and advocacy regarding violence against women.
- 2020-present Support and participation at the Region of Peel Family Violence Action Table and annual codesign of Region of Peel Violence Against Women campaign.





Response to Gender-Based Violence: Highlighted Actions (2023)

- 2023 Declaration of gender-based violence and intimate partner violence epidemic in Brampton.
- 2023 Development of Brampton's Employee
 Women Empowerment Network, a resource group
 focused on empowering women into leadership,
 providing mentorship and support for City-staff.
- 2023 Advocacy to the Association of Municipalities
 Ontario (AMO) for increased supports for gender-based violence and intimate partner violence.

Response to Gender-Based Violence: Highlighted Actions (upcoming)



- Dedicated breastfeeding spaces and dedicated parking spaces for parents at City of Brampton facilities.
- Women's Advisory Committee (Terms of Reference to be developed)
- Gender-Based Analysis Plus training for senior leaders and Council
- Advocacy to upper levels of government for:
 - Transitional housing such as that provided by Armagh House with its necessary wraparound supports, be included in building affordable housing
 - Advocacy for financial support for transitional housing (specifically Armagh House's pilot model in Brampton).





Annual #BreakTheSilence Violence Against Women Campaign

- The #BreakTheSilence campaign was developed with collaboration between the Region of Peel and community partners.
- The campaign has run annually since 2020 with materials targeting three key audiences:
 - Survivors
 - Bystanders
 - General Public
- All campaign flyers are translated into the top 5 languages in Peel.
- The 2023 campaign launches on November 24.








Annual #BreakTheSilence Violence Against Women Campaign

- In 2022, Peel Regional Police (PRP) reported almost 16,000 family and intimate partner violence disputes.
 On average, that is more than 43 disputes every day, or 1.8 every hour.
- That is just what gets reported. Most incidents are believed to be not reported.
- Data trends from PRP, 211, Assaulted Women's Helpline, and Embrave show increased reported incidents following the #BreakTheSilence campaign in 2022.




