
Community Safety and Well-being Plan | Overview

Peel's CSWB Plan 2020-2024:

- Legislative requirements in the Police Services Act, 1990 and the <u>Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019</u>, require municipal councils to create and adopt a community safety and well-being plan to address community risk factors
- Over 40 organizations, representing emergency services, police, school boards, health and social service providers and local governments, came together to develop Peel's Plan.
- Peel's Plan has a 4-year focus with three focus areas: Systemic Discrimination, Mental Health and Addictions, and Family Violence
- CSWB Secretariat provides backbone support, bringing together a diverse network of partners to implement and action the plan.
- New focus areas were subsequently added including guns and gangs and international students




CSWB Planning Framework

System Leadership Table (SLT)

Acts as the advisory committee for the development and implementation of the CSWB Plan in compliance with existing requirements under the *Police Services Act,* 1990 the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019

Membership: The Police Services Act, 1990 and Community Safety & Policing Act, 2019 outlines minimum requirements for the membership of the advisory committee that supports the development of the Plan

Extended Leadership Table (EXLT)

Steering Committee

Coordinates across CSWB Plan action tables/working groups to ensure consistency in approach and integration of collective efforts. Monitors for emerging issues, risks, and opportunities relevant to CSWB Plan outcomes. Provides advice and recommendations to the SLT on any substantive risks or changes to CSWB Plan implementation

Action Tables

Leads the planning and implementation, including delivery and execution of the goals/strategies for each area of focus of the Community Safety and Well-being Plan

Mental Health and Addictions: 2024 Action Table Activities

1. Newcomer youth and international students' mental wellness (2023/24 seed funding)

- Collaborative learning forum and follow-up trainings for the staff across various sectors
- Collecting youth perspectives and co-designing wellness spaces
- Co-developing targeted mental health stigma reduction video trainings for youth and families.

2. Coordinated advocacy

- 2023 provincial pre-budget submission
- Roundtable on Child and Youth Mental Health and Addictions in Peel: Summary Report shared with the Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addictions

3. Cross-sectoral collaboration and system integration

- Council Report on improved collaboration between Peel Region, school boards, and communitybased service providers
- Connections to Ontario Health Teams (OHTs) and other local initiatives

Responding to Community Issues

Building Safer Communities Fund (BSCF)

- In March 2022, the Government of Canada (Public Safety Canada) announced their commitment to support municipalities with crime prevention and safety through the BSCF program, which aims to prevent youth gun and gang violence.
- Peel Region signed a 3-year agreement with Public Safety Canada (PSC) for \$7.3 million in October 2023.
- BSCF runs from 2023/24 to 2025/26 (end date of March 31, 2026).
- In Peel the BSCF is being used to:
 - Foster the development of a system of support for youth and enhance relationships between system and community agencies
 - Develop a Youth Gun and Gang Prevention and Intervention Strategy for Peel
 - Provide funding to community organizations to support intervention and prevention

Supporting International Students in Peel

- Peel Region has committed to advancing the goals outlined in the Brampton Charter for Improving the International Student Experience (Resolution #2023-573).
- Given the complexity of the issues facing international students, the Region is forming an International Students Collaborative of key stakeholders across Peel, including academic institutions, community agencies, government, and individuals with lived experience to collectively develop a Charter implementation plan and advocacy strategy.
- The Collaborative is co-chaired by Peel Region and Sheridan College and will focus on further defining issues, identifying partnership opportunities, planning collective actions, and working with partners across Peel to advocate to other levels of government.
- In collaboration with key stakeholders, the Collaborative will be developing a plan to action out the Charter, including a collective approach to advocate to other levels of government.

Moving Forward

Review & Refresh of CSWB

- In the regulation, there is a requirement to review and, if appropriate, revise the plan by July 1, 2025 (O. Reg. 414/23).
- Recent changes with dissolution and further deliberation has led to us to reconsider the proposed approach to formulating the next iteration of the CSWB Plan
- Moving away from undertaking a traditional evaluation of tables
- Opportunity to **review** and reflect on our journey over the past years including learnings and collaborations we want to build upon
- Opportunity to **refresh** and reimagine how our work can be better aligned and integrated across the system and be more response to emerging needs
